

## Authentic Products Aligned to Common Core Writing Standards

### Purpose of this Document

In EL Education Schools, learning expeditions serve as the signature curricular structure to engage students and make content standards come to life. The culminating product of learning expeditions features high-quality student work. Ideally, these products are created for an authentic audience (an audience beyond the classroom and the teacher) while also challenging students to demonstrate mastery<sup>1</sup> towards one of the types of writing addressed in the Common Core State Standards (W.1, W.2, or W.3).

Notes:

- The chart below is intended to inspire options, not rigidly categorize. Some authentic products may align to more than one CCSS, since often one can “frame” the same authentic format in various ways (e.g., an article for a magazine could be either argumentative or explanatory). An authentic format may have multiple types of writing within it (e.g. a newspaper may include Op Eds and straight news stories). And authentic writing may “blend” writing types (e.g. narrative non-fiction).
- This document focuses specifically on the writing component of final products. Many products also can and should integrate the arts (drawings, video, etc.).

<b>Anchor standard W.1:</b> Write arguments to support claims in an analysis of substantive topics or texts using valid reasoning and relevant and sufficient evidence.	<b>Anchor standard W.2:</b> Write informative/explanatory texts to examine and convey complex ideas and information clearly and accurately through the effective selection, organization, and analysis of content.	<b>Anchor standard W.3:</b> Write narratives to develop real or imagined experiences or events using effective technique, well-chosen details and well-structured event sequences.

<sup>1</sup> Note that although final products almost always require writing, typically they do not serve as a strong way to assess students’ *independent* mastery (of W.1, W.2, or W.3). This is because final products are often created collaboratively and are always heavily scaffolded.
